Man Gets 25 Years in Prison for Burglary of Local Homes

Bryan, TX — Enrique Bravo, 26, of Houston, was pled guilty to three counts of Burglary of a Habitation, one count of Felon in Possession of a Firearm, and one count of Evading in a Motor Vehicle. The Honorable Judge Travis B. Bryan III sentenced Bravo to 25 years on each of three Burglaries and 20 years each on the Felon in Possession of a Firearm and Evading in a Motor Vehicle.

On August 25, 2016, officers of the College Station Police Department responded to a burglary in progress call in a neighborhood in south College Station. Witnesses had seen Bravo and two others leaving the scene of three different home burglaries in a silver 2016 Nissan Versa.

CSPD officers located the vehicle and attempted to conduct a traffic stop on the silver Nissan. Bravo increased speed and evaded from police. The car was last seen headed south on Highway 6 headed away from College Station.

Surrounding local and state law enforcement agencies were notified of the burglars who were fleeing through their jurisdictions. Grimes County officers picked up the pursuit heading south out of Grimes County into Waller County. Eventually the silver Nissan made it to Jersey Village where spike strips were deployed to stop the vehicle. While the burglars fled on foot, they were apprehended shortly after they exited the car.

The CSPD pursuit and capture of the burglars was assisted by Harris County Sherriff's Office, Grimes County Sherriff's Office, Texas Department of Public Safety, and Jersey Village Police Dept.

Property including jewelry and multiple firearms from the three burglaries in College Station was found in the silver Nissan and on the person of the burglars. Property including a firearm was recovered from the roadway as it had been thrown out of the car during the chase.

Bravo has been sentenced to prison once before in 2012 for Burglary of a Habitation.

"Vigilant citizens and police led to the quick capture of this burglar, and this lengthy prison sentence should cause others to hesitate before coming to Brazos County to commit their crimes."
